# DWC COMMUNITY,

The year 2022 marked a significant turning point for DWC, as we shifted from the era of COVID-19 "pivoting" to one of "reinvention." We broke ground for new permanent supportive housing projects in Van Nuys and North Hollywood, paving the way for more safe and stable homes for women in need. These projects are a testament to the power of collective action and the unwavering commitment of our community to end homelessness.

In addition, we reopened our Project Roomkey site as an interim shelter under the Every Woman Housed initiative, ensuring that vulnerable women have a place to find refuge and support. We also launched a mobile outreach team, expanding our reach to those in dire need and bringing our services directly to the streets. Furthermore, our vaccine ambassadors transitioned into community health workers, creating crucial pathways for consistent access to health and preventative care.

At DWC, we recognize that our work extends beyond providing immediate relief. We have taken significant steps in our social justice journey, focusing on four key pillars: supporting a living wage, focusing on internal trust, reimagining our shared leadership model, and creating a transparent decision-making process. In collaboration with Social Good Solutions, we have outlined a blueprint for true, transformative change, allowing us to align our actions with our mission, vision, and values. Through initiatives such as the Bridgespan Group's Leading for Impact

Program, we have further strengthened our organizational impact and theory of change, ensuring that every decision we make is in service of our community.

One of the highlights of the year was the coordination of volunteers for the first County-wide Women's Needs Assessment. This groundbreaking effort, the first to incorporate data from all six service planning areas, provided invaluable insights into the challenges faced by unhoused women in our city. Led by the remarkable Sofia Herrera of Hub for Urban Initiatives and Samantha Batko from the Urban Institute, our research team's findings have uplifted the importance of peer support and dignity.

We were also thrilled to bring back our annual gala, the Every Woman Housed Gala, which took place at LA Plaza de Cultura y Artes. It was a truly special night, reminiscent of a joyful family gathering in the park, complete with Latin jazz and delicious food from renowned LA establishments like Pink's Hot Dogs. We took the opportunity to recognize partners like Wells Fargo and Cedars-Sinai, whose support during the pandemic was instrumental in sustaining our housing justice programs and enabling our social justice work.

During the gala, I had the privilege of honoring three extraordinary women, Tiffany Mayberry, Kellie Hawkins, and LaRae Cantley, who have fearlessly used their voices to ensure that women are seen, counted, and heard. Their tireless efforts have made a profound difference in the lives of countless individuals.

Another significant achievement was the passage of SB 914, known as the HELP Act (Homeless Equity for Left Behind Populations). This legislation will play a vital role in reducing gender bias and disparities in California's response to homelessness, with a particular focus on unaccompanied women, domestic violence survivors and other vulnerable populations. Our advocacy efforts, triumphs, and future opportunities have been greatly shaped by this milestone.

None of these accomplishments would have been possible without the incredible support of our Board of Directors. Their creativity, support, humor, and critical feedback have been the bedrock of our leadership team throughout this triumphant yet challenging year. I would like to extend a special mention to the new board members who joined us in 2022—Ruth Edwards, Brendan-Ranson Walsh, Cindy Starrett, Kara Hollis, and Sara Sugarman—who have brought fresh perspectives and energy to our cause.

Finally, I must express my utmost admiration and gratitude to the DWC staff. Their unwavering dedication, ingenuity, resilience, and commitment to our mission continue to overwhelm me. Every day, they go above and beyond to ensure that women experiencing homelessness receive the support, care, and opportunities they deserve. Their tireless efforts truly embody the spirit of DWC.

As we move forward, we remain committed to ending homelessness among women in Los Angeles. We are determined to build upon the successes of the past year, continuing to innovate, collaborate, and advocate for those who need our support the most.

#### DWC EXPANDS ITS REACH:

#### BRINGING HOPE TO LOS ANGELES COUNTY

Since its establishment in 1978, the Downtown Women's Center (DWC) has been a beacon of hope and support for unhoused women in the Skid Row Community of Los Angeles. Over the years, DWC has evolved from providing outreach services to offering a comprehensive continuum of care, including becoming the first provider of permanent supportive housing for women in the nation. Now, the organization is expanding into Los Angeles County. DWC's recent groundbreaking ceremonies in North Hollywood and Van Nuys mark the first steps towards this ambitious expansion plan.

The first residential development, presently named NoHo 5050, is a new 40-unit residential development composed of eight two-bedroom units, 28 one-bedroom units, and four studio units for individuals and families, including trauma survivors. The five-story development will offer a number of amenities such as a learning center, a community room, a laundry room, bicycle storage, and landscaped open space.

Continuing its expansion efforts, DWC's next endeavor is the development known as Oatsie's Place, named for longtime DWC-supporter Marylouise Oates. Oatsie's Place will be a new 45-unit residential development composed of 25 one-bedroom units and 20 studio units for individuals and families, including trauma survivors. Oatsie's Place will offer a number of amenities such as a learning center, a

community room, a laundry room, and landscaped open space. DWC will provide case management and supportive services at both sites, ensuring that residents have access to the resources necessary to break the cycle of homelessness and regain stability in their lives.

To bring NoHo 5050 and Oatsie's Place to fruition, DWC has partnered with Daylight Community Development, The Decro Group, FSY Architects (NoHo 5050), Studio Eleven (Oatsie's Place), and Trillium Property Management. By leveraging their collective expertise, these partners aim to create an inclusive and supportive environment that fosters growth and wellbeing for its residents.

NoHo 5050 and Oatsie's Place are just the beginning of DWC's ambitious plan to bring over 250 permanent supportive housing units online by 2027. With each new development, DWC expands its reach and impact, ensuring that more individuals and families receive the care and support they need to transition out of homelessness permanently. These initiatives are a significant milestone in the organization's history and demonstrate an unwavering commitment to addressing homelessness in Los Angeles County.

NoHo 5050 and Oatsie's Place will open their doors in 2024.

#### EVERY WOMAN HOUSED:

# ENDING WOMEN'S HOMELESSNESS IN SKID ROW

In 2021, the Downtown Women's Center (DWC) introduced the Every Woman Housed Initiative, a groundbreaking roadmap for addressing the pressing issue of homelessness among women and families in the skid row community. With over 600 unsheltered women and families in need, DWC recognized the urgency of providing culturally responsive services to a historically underserved population, combining their experience and learnings from previous programs, such as Project Roomkey and the landmark Housing Justice Program.

Unlike traditional emergency services that only offer temporary relief, the Every Woman Housed model takes a comprehensive approach, concurrently providing outreach, short-term interventions, and long-term solutions. DWC's focus on "what happens next" has proven effective in the past, with their Project Roomkey site becoming one of the most successful in placing women in permanent housing. This emphasis on sustainable solutions remains a cornerstone of the Every Woman Housed Initiative.

The success of the Every Woman Housed model can be attributed to the wraparound supportive services it offers. Housing specialists play a crucial role in assisting women with housing navigation and retention, ensuring that once housed, they have the necessary support to maintain stability. Peer specialists, who possess lived experience and extensive

knowledge of community resources, provide invaluable guidance and understanding to women who have endured long-term homelessness and trauma. Employment coordinators address the barriers that women face in securing employment, helping them access job training, develop necessary skills, and connect with potential employers. Furthermore, the Initiative prioritizes trauma-informed and culturally responsive emotional support. Clinicians are on hand to provide specialized care, acknowledging the unique experiences and challenges that unhoused women may have faced. By addressing emotional well-being and fostering resilience, DWC ensures that women have the tools to rebuild their lives and thrive in their new homes.

In November 2022, Los Angeles County received a grant of nearly \$15 million from Governor Newsom and the State of California through the Encampment Resolution Funding Program. This funding aims to support pathways to safe housing for 500 women and families living in the Skid Row Community, strengthening the efforts of the Every Woman Housed Initiative.

The DWC's Every Woman Housed Initiative stands as a shining example of a comprehensive, compassionate, and effective approach to addressing homelessness among women.

THE HELP ACT

#### CALIFORNIA SENATE BILL 914:

# A GROUNDBREAKING STEP TOWARDS EMPOWERING UNACCOMPANIED WOMEN AND SURVIVORS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

The passing of California Senate Bill 914, introduced by California State Senator Susan Rubio and co-sponsored by the Downtown Women's Center, Rainbow Services, and the California Partnership to End Domestic Violence, marks a significant milestone in the state's commitment to addressing the needs of unaccompanied women and survivors of domestic and intimate partner violence. This groundbreaking legislation, the first of its kind in the nation, mandates goal setting for these vulnerable populations, making California a trailblazer in prioritizing their welfare and empowerment.


The success of Senate Bill 914, known as the HELP ACT (Homeless Equity for Left Behind Populations) is due to the tremendous support it received from various local policy makers and stakeholders. In 2020, both Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors and the Los Angeles City Council unanimously passed motions uplifting the plight of unaccompanied women, demonstrating a growing consensus to address their unique challenges. This local recognition paved the way for a broader conversation and laid the foundation for legislative action. The bill's introduction by Senator Susan Rubio, a survivor herself, further amplified the urgency of addressing the needs of unaccompanied women and survivors of domestic violence in California.

Over 100 organizations, including California Attorney General Rob Bonta, lent their support to the bill. Their advocacy provided a united voice and emphasized the importance of establishing tangible goals to ensure that the unique needs and circumstances of these individuals are considered when formulating policies and implementing programs. By mandating goal setting, the legislation provides a framework for prioritizing assistance, resources, and support services tailored specifically to these vulnerable populations.

As Continuums of Care throughout the state deliberate on their strategies and set goals, Los Angeles and Downtown Women's Center stand at the forefront, presenting an opportunity to be a model for the rest of California and the nation.

The Homeless Equity for Left Behind Populations Act will go into effect in January 2025.


